April Demonstration Report

Kieran Reynolds was our demonstrator in April and the first for over two years so was a most welcome visitor. He explained that he was going to make a three-part goblet, in Cindy Drozda style, to show how small burrs can be used to best effect. This was one of his Covid lockdown experiments when he would subject himself to self-imposed isolation in his workshop solely to do the right thing for the World. Such selflessness has to be commended.

A small burr piece was chosen for the cup and a recess was drilled with a Forstner bit to provide a location for a drive. Kieran shaped the bowl taking care to cut towards the burr when shaping the exterior at the top in order to prevent chip-out at the rim. He cut a small tenon for the chuck so that the piece could be turned around for hollowing. A revolving centre in the tailstock provided support while hollowing as the chucking tenon was very

small. A tip was to raise the tool rest to allow better access to the blank when hollowing. Kieran used a bowl gouge and a hollowing tool made from an Allen key to remove wood when access with the gouge was restricted. These tools are easily made but it is worth reminding ourselves that the short arm of the Allen key needs to be reduced by at least half it's length in order to prevent the tool from trying to rotate when used. Sharpening is done with a diamond card on the bevel. The bevel angle isn't critical and, considering the cost of Allen keys, a number of different tools with varying angles could be cheaply produced.

When the tailstock is removed to complete the cuts on the interior of the bowl light cuts should be made to avoid stressing the small tenon in the chuck. The final refining of the interior was done with a negative rake scraper, a tool Kieran has found extremely efficient and less liable to catch than regular scrapers. He sharpens his with a diamond hone on the bevel sharpening towards the top to produce a fine burr edge which gives a superb finishing cut.

In order to sand the inside of the cup Kieran used a small pad with a 50mm sanding disk. The advantage is that the overhanging part of the sanding disk sands the edge of the burr gently which helps to avoid breaking it.

Having finished the inside of the bowl it was turned around onto a small jam chuck with a piece of carpet inside to ease the pressure on the bowl and the tailstock was brought up to support it. Then the small tenon was removed with a spindle gouge and the tiny nub remaining removed with a chisel and sandpaper. The finish applied was Woodoc Polywax. There are various versions and various manufacturers making similar products e.g. Osmo.

The base of the piece was made from a piece of burr the same as the top. Kieran pointed out that it doesn't have to be perfectly round at the edge when shaped because the imperfections are attractive, especially in burrs. The base was shaped with a small tenon to allow the bottom to be finished and drilled for the stem. It was then turned onto an egg-cup chuck to remove the tenon that

was used for chucking. It was sanded and finished with polywax.

The stem was made from a piece of Oak but Ebony or African Blackwood is Kieran's preferred wood because black works well with other woods. However, in a demo there is less likelihood of disaster with Oak so that is why it was used in this situation. The blank was rounded and a cup cut in the end to hold the top of the piece later. The tailstock was brought up to gently support the end while the profile was being cut. Kieran cut and sanded (to P600) as he went down the stem because it would be difficult to go back later and, at the base of the stem, he cut a tenon to match the hole in the base, measuring frequently to ensure a good fit.

The Oak stem was treated with a vinegar and steel wool mixture, or, in Kieran's case, vinegar and grinder filings although vinegar and rusty nails works just as well. The mixture reacts with the Oak and turns in black. It's a very effective way to produce 5000 year old Bog Oak on demand!

Kieran ended his demo with a display of many three-piece goblets to show that there is basically no limit to what we can do with seemingly 'useless' pieces of burr.

We thank Kieran for his wonderful demonstration and hope to see him back in the Wood Shed again.
